WHEN WE PLAY


Each week throughout the year, thousands of players will represent their schools in a display of their skills and abilities. Many spectators will share their thrills.

The program provides free courses at the University of Chattanooga for the top students from Tennessee, Georgia and Alabama.




The purpose of the junior high school is obviously to help the student to grow away from elementary and into secondary trends of thought.
